DAY SHELTER

First City Homeless Services held their 3rd annual Empty Bowl supper. Fourteen restaurants provided the soup, and three businesses provided funds for the bowls, which were actually large mugs. The people who bought tickets for the event could have all the soup they wanted plus keep the bowls. Over 200 people came and \$5,000 was raised.



The Ketchikan Homeless Day Shelter, which is housed in the fellowship hall of our church, is meeting a recognized need in the community and finding assistance from the city, the borough, the state, businesses and individuals.

CHOOSE RESPECT

How likely are you to be raped? It may be a question of geography. A sobering CNN series of reports examined rape statistics across the country and uncovered a wide variety of crime rates – with Alaska clocking in at triple the national average. Even more shockingly, its child sexual assault rate is six times the national average. Governor Sean Parnell calls it "an epidemic." And statistics paint an incomplete picture, because they only reveal reported rapes. The true rate, in Alaska and nationwide, is likely considerably higher.



Domestic violence is a sad reality for Alaskans. Each year the governor proclaims a day to have a "Choose Respect" rally. Our march begins across the street from our church and goes down Main Street. Though a rally is not enough, at least it is a first step. Bringing awareness and encouraging people to speak up must be done to initiate concrete action toward eradicating this blight.
